

	John chaired the meeting and welcomed everyone.  The members introduced themselves for the guest;  Chris McLean, Department for Infrastructure

Notes	The notes were approved. John commended Briege and Joanne on the notes and it was agreed that going forward the notes would be more action orientated.

Department for Infrastructure An Roinn Bonneagair	John welcomed Chris to the meeting and gave a brief overview of the remit of BMG.  Chris thanked the members for the invite and gave an apology for his director	
	Moira Doherty. Chris is responsible for Community Transport Services within NI,	

the Concessionary Fares Scheme and the Rathlin Ferry. Chris gave an overview on the Concessionary Fares Scheme existence. The Scheme promotes social inclusion and reduces social exclusion by providing concessions and half fares for those at most risk in the community.

Chris outlined the following aspects of the scheme:

- Current eligibility
- History of the Scheme
- Wider Policy issues
- Performance of the Scheme
- Uptake, usage and journeys
- Costs
- Future projections
- Discussion

Chris asked members for any questions.

Questions were asked around the following:

- legal requirements of DDA legislation
- social exclusion
- half fare passes for people with a learning disability or mental illness
- lack of transport availability at particular times
- the new Belfast Rapid Transit Glider, etc.

Chris told members that the Equality
Impact Assessment was met and the
Department continues to apply this
approach. Chris said the Department
funds rural community transport
partnerships. These are accessible buses
that can go from door to door and pick
people up and take them to where they
need to go. This is called the Dial a Lift
scheme. In urban centres there is the
Disability Action Transport Scheme. This
is for people with disabilities within urban
areas to access and is a door to door
scheme.

Chris noted that the Department recognises that the Concessionary Fares Scheme has not been reviewed since 2008 and recognised that there are some parts of the scheme that are not 100% perfect. Chris said the Department would need Ministerial approval for a review of the scheme as it would mean policy changes.

The Department actively recognises what the needs of the individuals are particularly in terms of transport and continue to work through these, in particular, via the Accessible Transport Strategy.

Joanne said that when she had spoken

with Chris prior to the meeting he was very mindful that the legislation was outdated. He also felt it would be challenging to come and speak about something that perhaps needs to be looked at. Joanne thinks it might be worth touching on the Integrated Transport Project. The project is currently subject to review and is on hold at present. It was a joint project between the Department's for Infrastructure, Health and Education. The aim is to make best use of available fleet. Joanne asked Chris does he envisage that there could be opportunities for better accessibility for people with this project in the future.

Chris replied that the Department's focus is on accessibility. The fact that there is a strategy would totally support this in terms of checking if there is a better way of doing things.

Chris told members that, subject to Ministerial approval, if the Department review the concessionary fares scheme he will ensure all items raised today are shared and explored.

John thanked Chris for attending the meeting. He indicated that BMG would follow up in writing outlining

	Letter issued to Trusts re: Supported Living Accommodation – Joanne updated the group that all the responses have been received and were emailed to members. There was no continuity across the consistency of the approach to the responses. The information received does not give us any demand or supply issues. The Southern Trust seems to have the biggest waiting numbers at present.  Iolo told members he is involved in this work directly and would update the group. As part of resettlement across learning disability mainly there have been a number of patients (as we call people who are in hospital) who shouldn't really be in hospital but are not quite ready to be living in the community with support. The Southern Trust are piloting a step up, step down model. They have a crisis response house and are looking to see if this can be developed locally initially, and if it works, it may be developed across Trusts regionally. reviewing their part of this programme for the last 12 months. Looking at what they are currently providing; the costs of the model about (£40 million per year) and what it looks like.

lolo gave an update on the Needs
Assessment – the HSC Board has started discussion with the five HSC Trusts. There is no current mechanism to identify the current need in each locality. In the past people would have been on a housing list which would be held in the local housing offices. No one has looked to see how many people are living with older carers who may need housing over the next 10 years. There will be specific criteria and questions which the Trusts are all signed up too.

After hearing the updates from Iolo it was agreed that the BMG would wait on the completion of the needs assessments from each Trust and then invite them to present this at a future BMG meeting.

Questions for Housing Executive – it was agreed that in lieu of questions we would ask the representative from the Housing Executive to present to the group on the Supporting People Programme as a whole.
